

movies as an atlas of influence, a collection of landmarks, and the hope is that â | there will be at least one movie that readers will choose to watch for the first time.â • Which seems odd, because there are many movies here (especially those covered in only one page) that donâ ™t give any explanation as to why they were deemed worthy of knocking other, more well-deserving films off the list. It is hard to believe anyone would approach an encyclopedia of a celandmarka • films and choose to leave out â ceThe French Connection, â • â ceThe Poseidon Adventure, â • â œHalloween,â • â œRaiders of the Lost Ark,â • â œGhostbusters,â • â œDie Hard,â • â œBasic Instinct, â • â œSilence of the Lambs, â • â œSeven, â • and every James Bond movie ever made. It seems hard to believe that a book alleging to include â œinfluentialâ • films would give â œStar Warsâ • only 182 words (about the length of this paragraph) in a 350-page book. There is little â œbehind the scenesâ • material here. Regarding â œNosferatu,â • we are told simply that it was â œnearly destroyed following a lawsuitâ • and thatâ ™s it â " just that sentence. This is not a book about moviemaking, it is an encyclopedia of movies that have been made. Each one includes a footnote called â œWhat Else to Watchâ • which unfortunately includes not only movies that arenâ TMt clearly obvious why they are relevant to the movie being discussed, but also includes some movies so bad they should never be recommended at all. As an example of the former, the â œStar Warsâ • entry says to also watch â œThe Hidden Fortressâ • but doesnâ ™t tell you WHY. (Film buffs, of course, will already know why.

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
